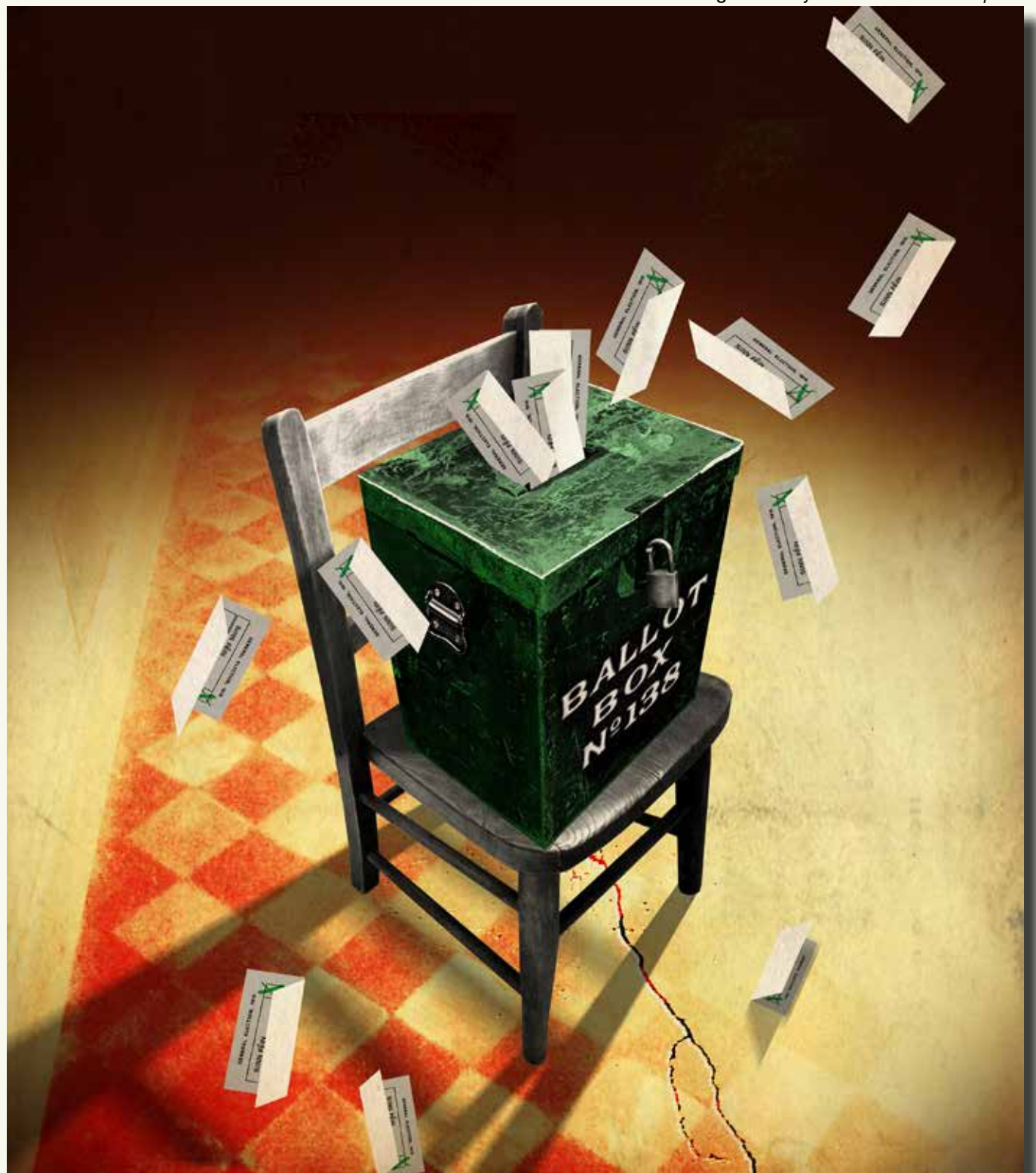




THE PRESS AND THE VOTE

'Journalism is another name for democracy, or, better, you cannot have journalism without democracy', said American journalism scholar James Carey. The NPHFI's 2018 conference explores the relationship between journalism, journalists, democracy and elections on the 100th anniversary of the pivotal 1918 election. That election saw women vote in Britain and Ireland for the first time, the extension of the franchise, and the victory of Sinn Féin and the subsequent establishment of the first Dáil. Over two days at NUI Galway, the relationship between the press and the vote will be discussed and debated.
