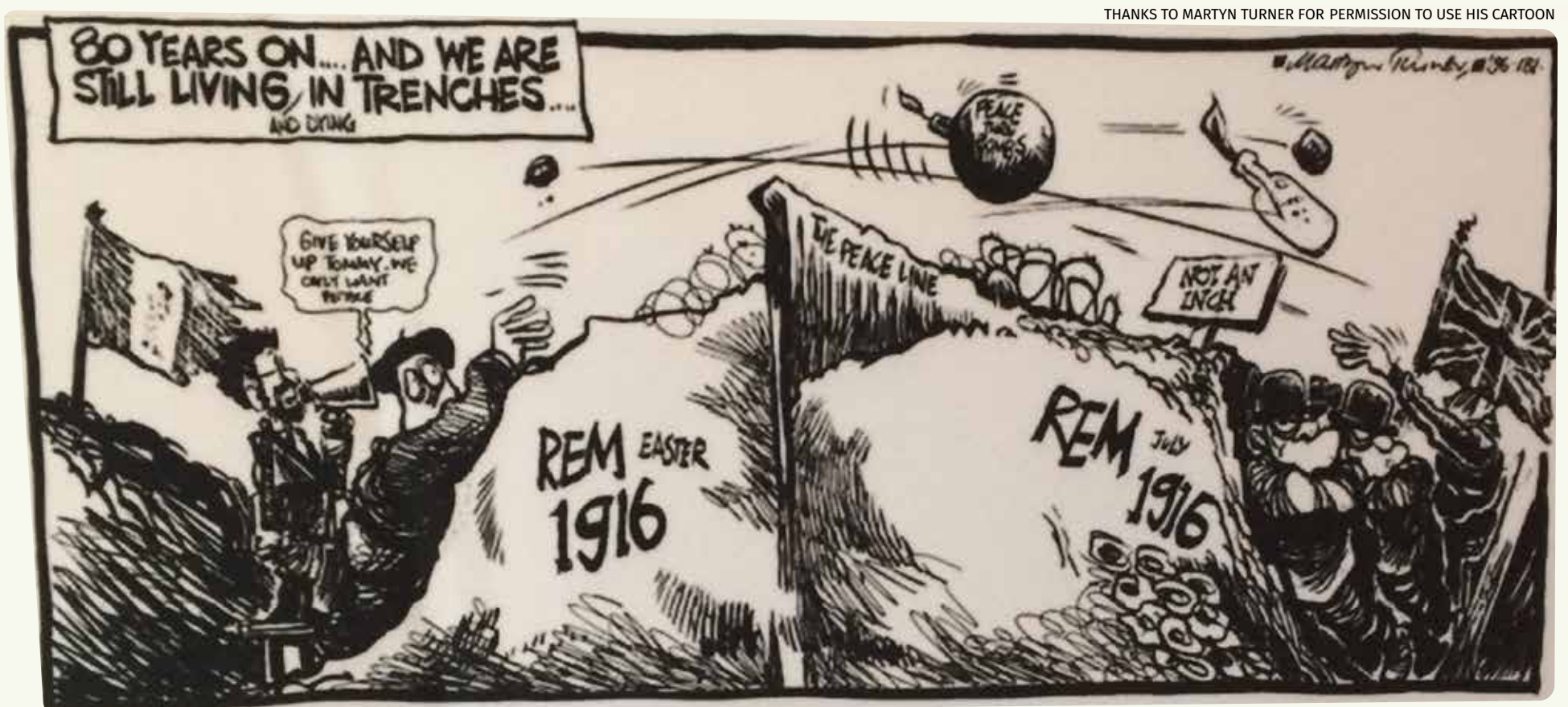


THE PRESS AND DIVIDED SOCIETIES
